Living Our Faith in the Workplace

Matthew 5:13-16; Daniel

Following the lesson on Our Influence on Others, we'll finish up with applying those thoughts to how we can influence the people with whom we work.

Background Passage:

¹³"You are the salt of the earth; but if the salt has become tasteless, how will it be made salty *again*? It is good for nothing anymore, except to be thrown out and trampled under foot by men. ¹⁴You are the light of the world. A city set on a hill cannot be hidden. ¹⁵Nor do *men* light a lamp, and put it under the peck-measure, but on the lampstand; and it gives light to all who are in the house. ¹⁶Let your light shine before men in such a way that they may see your good works, and glorify your Father who is in heaven. - Matthew 5:13-16

I'll remind you of a question I asked last week. How would you describe your light? Is it hidden? Barely smoldering? Weakly flickering? Burning brightly?

Biblical Example:

Today, let's talk about how we can make sure we are salt and light to our coworkers. To get us started thinking in that direction, I would like to use a great example from Scripture, Daniel. In the following passages, listen for relevant, practical ways Daniel lived out his faith as a government worker in Babylon.

Daniel 1:17-21 - ¹⁷And as for these four youths, God gave them knowledge and intelligence in every *branch of* literature and wisdom; Daniel even understood all *kinds of* visions and dreams. ¹⁸Then at the end of the days which the king had specified for presenting them, the commander of the officials presented them before Nebuchadnezzar. ¹⁹And the king talked with them, and out of them all not one was found like Daniel, Hananiah, Mishael and Azariah; so they entered the king's personal service. ²⁰And as for every matter of wisdom and understanding about which the king consulted them, he found them ten times better than all the magicians *and* conjurers who *were* in all his realm. ²¹And Daniel continued until the first year of Cyrus the king.

In what relevant, practical ways did Daniel live out his faith as a student in Babylon?

Daniel 6:3-5 - ³Then this Daniel began distinguishing himself among the commissioners and satraps because he possessed an extraordinary spirit, and the king planned to appoint him over the entire kingdom. ⁴Then the commissioners and satraps began trying to find a ground of accusation against Daniel in regard to government affairs; but they could find

no ground of accusation or *evidence of* corruption, inasmuch as he was faithful, and no negligence or corruption was *to be* found in him. ⁵Then these men said, "We shall not find any ground of accusation against this Daniel unless we find *it* against him with regard to the law of his God."

In what relevant, practical ways did Daniel live out his faith as a government
worker in Babylon?
